PART I The Interview (10/25-10/28)

- Conduct a 15-minute face-to-face interview with a peer
- This will be completed during class on 10/25-10/28
- Select questions from the list below. You can also ask 1 question of your choice. Keep in mind you this interview will last 15 minutes- be prepared with plenty of questions!
 - Like Melissa Williford said, it is okay to ask follow up questions based on the answers you get.
- Think about how you would like to have your questions ready and make notes- on your laptop, piece of paper, record on your phone?

PART II Paper (10/29-11/1)

Compose a 1-page write up of your interview. This will be completed in class on 10/29-11/1

- WHAT YOU SHOULD INCLUDE:
 - You are basically creating a profile of this person- give a recap of information you learned about the person you interviewed.
 - Told in a narrative style. For example, "When I interviewed Mrs. Landry I learned so much about her! First of all she absolutely loves tightrope walking! As a little girl she always wanted to be in the circus"
 - Check out this **profile** of Ryan Murphy for an example:
- WHAT YOU SHOULD *NOT* INCLUDE:
 - Information about mannerisms during the interview (i.e. nervous, quiet, loud, body language etc.)

PART III Presentation (11/6-11/11)

Create a 2-minute presentation highlighting the key points of the interview

- You may have a timer. I will cut you off at 2 minutes exactly.
- You may have note cards BUT should only use them to guide your presentation not recite verbatim.
- You will be speaking at the podium
- No visual component.
- Presentations will be assigned for the following days:
 - RED: November 4 and 6
 - GREY: November 5 and 7

<u>TIPS</u>

- Treat the interview like a conversation with structure! Begin with your list of questions Follow chance openings Keep in mind your objectives
- Actively listen to understand and report
 Affirm that you understand what they are saying
 Do not agree or disagree with the person
 Do not debate what they have to say

• While taking notes,

don't hesitate to ask for clarifications or better understanding:

- o "Could you repeat that, please? I want to make sure I get all of that down."
- \circ ~ "I am not sure I followed that, do you mean that...."

• Know when to be quiet

Listen carefully so that you know when to let your source pause to collect his or her thoughts. Don't feel the need to fill every empty space with conversation

Don't be afraid to say you don't understand, or need more explanation.
 Use your own words to repeat back; ask:
 "So what you're saying is ..." or "So let me get this straight..."

Always be willing to be surprised; follow chance openings
 Don't think you know what the story is about.
 Don't let your own feelings or bias shape the questions you ask
